The society hosted Civil War scholar and lecturer Howard Coffin to share some of the results of his research for a new book on Civil War sites in Vermont on October 25, sponsored by the Vermont Humanities Council. He arrived at 4 pm to tour Civil War sites in Chittenden, including Bump and Wetmore Cemeteries, and gather Chittenden information for his book. Members of the Chittenden, Pittsfield and Pittsford Historical Societies joined for a potluck supper in Town Hall. Many others from the community joined us for his talk and shared dessert at 7:30.

Cemeteries

Members of the society met in January with Cemetery Commissioners and a Rutland Eagle Scout for a project to begin in spring at

Wetmore Cemetery to map and inventory stones, noting those that need repair.

Cataloguing

Regular sessions for cataloguing were suspended in cold weather, but they are expected to resume after warmer weather returns. The Chittenden Historical Society is very pleased to announce four recent donations to society collections:

Grange Hall

We are very excited about the \$15,000 grant from the State of Vermont and the Vermont Cultural Facilities Coalition through the Vermont Arts Council, which was awarded to the Town on January 11, 2008 at an awards ceremony in Montpelier. This grant, which requires matching funds, will furnish a lift for handicap accessibility and electricity for the lift, emergency lighting and one level of general lighting at the Grange Hall.

Other grants for the project, through Preservation Trust of Vermont, are \$15,000 from the Freeman Foundation for structural repair and \$5,000 from the Cerf Community Fund for repair of the plaster ceiling.

There will be request on the Town Meeting ballot to continue funding at the current level of \$20,000 per year towards completion of the Grange Hall project as a cultural and recreational center for the community.

This year's progress has been to correct structural issues and to renovate the exterior shell and to add the shell of the addition to house the bathrooms and lift. The completion of this

year's project will have to wait for warmer weather.

The bid for construction of this **stabilization** phase was awarded to Dave Dutton of Dutton Construction in Chittenden. He has chosen local subcontractors to work with him: Stub Smith for excavation and Jud Thurston for masonry.

The next phase will be for **occupation**, finishing the interiors of both levels. The historical society looks forward to the community use of this historic building.
